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Background and Methodology

Patrick E. Gonzales graduated magna cum laude from the University of Baltimore with a degree in political science.

His career in the field of public opinion research began in the mid-1980s as an analyst with *Mason-Dixon Opinion Research*. During this time, Mr. Gonzales helped develop, craft and implement election surveys and exit polls for television and radio in the Baltimore-Washington D.C. metro area.

Mr. Gonzales has polled and analyzed thousands of elections in Maryland and across the country over the past forty years. Further, he and his associates have conducted numerous market research projects, crafting message development plans and generating strategy blueprints for businesses and organizations throughout the state.

Over his decades of conducting public opinion polls, Patrick Gonzales has been widely recognized by his peers for his ability to conduct unbiased surveys, and analyze the results in an impartial, evenhanded manner.

Mr. Gonzales appears frequently on radio and television in the Baltimore-D.C. region as a guest commentator.

This poll was conducted by *Gonzales Research & Media Services, Inc.* from December 27th, 2024 through January 4th, 2025. A total of 811 registered voters in Maryland, who indicated they are likely to vote in the next election, were queried by live telephone interviews, utilizing both landline and cell phone numbers. A cross-section of interviews was conducted throughout the state, reflecting general election voting patterns.

The margin of error (MOE), per accepted statistical standards, is a range of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points. If the entire population was surveyed, there is a 95% probability that the true numbers would fall within this range.

Like sands through the hourglass, so are the days of our lives...another legislative session in Maryland begins Wednesday.

Statewide, 61% of Free State voters approve of the job Wes Moore is doing as governor, while 28% disapprove of his performance in office, with 11% not offering an opinion. By party, 79% of Democrats approve of the job Governor Moore is doing and 12% disapprove; 53% of independents approve and 38% disapprove; and among Republicans, 33% approve, while 52% disapprove.

Seventy-five percent of African American voters give the Governor a thumbs up, as do 76% in Baltimore City.

Governor Moore's overall job rating among Maryland voters (61% approval) is more than satisfactory, but within the number a softness of intensity (only 29% *strong* approval) is present that might pose issues in the future.

We asked respondents to think ahead and tell us who they would vote for if the 2026 election for governor *were held today*. Statewide, 52% say they'd vote for Democrat Moore, while 38% say they would vote for Republican Larry Hogan, with 10% undecided. These poll numbers are very similar to the election results two months ago, when former Governor Hogan vied for the open senate seat in Maryland.

Former Governor Hogan has enjoyed a very distinguished career in politics, but his *neither fish nor fowl* style that served him so well during his tenure in office has become a touch passé in the current day political gestalt. His prospects next year, should he decide to run, will be determined largely by events beyond his control. If an aggressive "tax enhancement" package is passed and signed into law this session, voters come New Year's Day 2026 might be very resolute in their desire for a return to Governor Hogan's 8 years in office.

Fittingly, we next asked voters about the looming budget deficit and their views

regarding the revenue side of fixing it. Given the economic concerns among voters highlighted constantly throughout the recent presidential campaign, not much enthusiasm exists among Marylanders for raising taxes as a way to deal with the deficit.

Voters constantly express a willingness to pay taxes for needed services like transportation and public safety, but not for a problem they believe their elected representatives created.

Only 17% say they support an increase in the state income tax to deal with the deficit, while 76% oppose this...60% "strongly" oppose.

Twenty-three percent support an increase in the sales tax, with 73% opposing a sales tax hike...55% "strongly" oppose.

And finally, a mere 18% of Maryland voters say they support, as a way to deal with the deficit, an increase in the state property tax, while 77% oppose -65% "strongly" oppose.

Governor Wes Moore Job Approval

In Maryland, 61% approve of the job Wes Moore is doing as governor (29% "strongly" approve and 32% "somewhat" approve), while 28% disapprove of the job Moore's doing (16% "strongly" disapprove and 12% "somewhat" disapprove), with 11% furnishing no opinion.

By party, 79% of Democrats, 33% of Republicans, and 53% of independents approve of the job Governor Moore is doing in Annapolis.



Sixty-one percent approval is a job rating any governor would accept, but a 1.1-to-1 soft ratio (32% "somewhat" approve/29% "strongly" approve) is not a desirable split.

2026 Gubernatorial Match-up

Thinking ahead, we asked Maryland voters if the 2026 election *were held today*, for whom would they vote for governor if the candidates were Democrat Wes Moore and Republican Larry Hogan

Statewide, 52% say they'd vote for Moore, while 38% say they'd vote for Hogan, with 10% undecided.

Budget Deficit

According to state budget analysts, Maryland is forecasted to face a near \$3 billion deficit in the coming year, which could grow to nearly \$6 billion over the next five years. In fearless leader Newspeak, "important decisions" are going to need to be made to protect the state from "severe uncertainty" in order to balance the budget.

We asked voters their readiness to pay more in taxes to help deal with the deficit after informing them about the current and projected deficit the state faces. The results:

Property Tax

Would you support or oppose an increase in the state property tax to deal with this deficit?

Not surprisingly, 90% of Republicans (80% *strongly*) and 79% of unaffiliated voters (73% *strongly*) oppose an increase in the state property tax to deal with the deficit, but so do 70% of Democrats (55% *strongly*) and 83% of African American (76% *strongly*) voters.

The "important decision" for Governor Moore over the next 90 days is how much political capital he's willing to spend to balance the budget...71% of voters who "strongly approve" of the job Wes Moore is doing as governor (his base) oppose raising the property tax to deal with the deficit.
